MAYOR'S MINUTE

A LETTER FROM MAYOR QOURZAL

Dear Woodway,

With summer behind us, kids back in school, and the return of football season, fall truly is my favorite season. Even though it may still be hot outside, I hope you will take time to get outdoors and enjoy all the activities Woodway has to offer!

Your council has been hard at work for the past several months working on next year's city budget. I am pleased to report that we have officially adopted a no-new-revenue tax rate (.363836 per \$100 of assessed property value) and a balanced budget for the 2025-2026 fiscal year! This decision reflects our commitment to responsible governance and our people-first values. While I can't promise we will always be able to maintain a no-new revenue rate as changes in operating costs fluctuate, I am happy to report that, pending the formal adoption by their respective city councils of all rates currently proposed, Woodway now has the lowest property tax rate in McLennan County! Our balanced budget ensures continued investment in public safety, infrastructure, recreation, and essential services. We also continue to prioritize transparency and digital access by posting all of our budget information on the city website, making it easier for taxpayers to see how their money is being utilized.

This achievement is the result of thoughtful planning, collaboration, and a shared vision for Woodway's future. I'm proud of our council and city for their dedication, and I'm grateful to you: our residents for your trust and support. Thank you for making Woodway the best place to live, grow, and thrive!

Cities utilize boards and commissions to enhance civic engagement, broaden the scope of local governance, and ensure diverse perspectives are considered in decision-making. Each May, our elected City Council approves the appointments of new and returning applicants to each of four active boards and commissions that play a crucial advisory role, helping to shape public policy and offer guidance for various aspects of city operations in Woodway.

Here is a more detailed look at the purposes served by appointed boards and commissions:

- **Citizen Engagement and Representation:**

Boards and commissions provide a structured way for citizens to participate in local government. By serving on these bodies, residents can contribute their expertise, perspectives, and community knowledge to the decision-making process.

- **Advisory Role:**

These bodies primarily act in an advisory capacity to the city council or other governing body. They provide recommendations, feedback, and analysis on proposed policies, projects, or regulations, helping elected officials make well-informed choices.

- **Specialized Expertise, Efficiency, and Oversight:**

Many boards and commissions focus on specific areas like planning, zoning, historic preservation, or economic development, as determined by the size and general needs of the city. This allows for the involvement of individuals with specialized knowledge and experience in these fields, providing guidance and informing decisions on complex issues.

- **Diverse Perspectives:**

Boards and commissions can help ensure that a wide range of viewpoints are considered in the decision-making process. This can lead to more inclusive and equitable outcomes for the community.

City Operations Explained: Boards and Commissions (continued)

- **Community Involvement:**

Serving on a board or commission can be a rewarding experience for volunteers, allowing them to develop new skills, gain valuable experience, and make a positive contribution to their community.

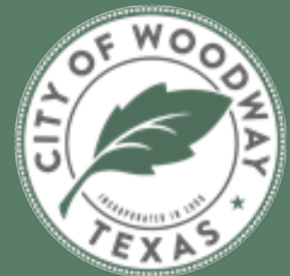
Rewards for services are not measured in dollars but in the satisfaction of knowing that you care enough to give back to your community. The City Council conducts an annual call for board/commission applications early each year. The City Council Nominating Committee meets in April to consider appointments to fill all anticipated vacancies and then makes a recommendation to the entire City Council for action in May. Appointments are also made during the year as vacancies occur.

There are currently four established boards and commissions, three of which meet on a regular basis. More information on meetings and qualifications are available on the Application for Volunteer Service form, linked here, but briefly:

- The **Planning & Zoning Commission** holds regular meetings each month to act on a wide variety of issues involving zoning and development within the City of Woodway, conducting public hearings and making recommendations to City Council regarding these issues as appropriate.
- The **Parks & Recreation Commission** is an advisory body to the City Council on all matters relating to recreational facilities in Woodway. This commission holds regular meetings in January, March, May, August, and October, and occasionally assists with special events and projects throughout the year.
- The **Youth Commission** is made up of Woodway residents in grades 7 through 12 who serve as an advisory body to the City Council on matters relating to young citizens. Except for June and July, regular meetings are held each month and members are expected to assist with special events and projects conducted throughout the year.
- The **Board of Adjustment** addresses appeals filed with the City regarding application and interpretation of certain ordinances pertaining to zoning and nonconforming uses of real property. There is no regular meeting schedule. These members meet only under the advisement of the City Attorney.

Those interested in applying for appointment should consider attending a meeting to familiarize themselves with the roles and procedures of the board or commission. Applications will open again in early 2026 and be due to the City Secretary by April 15, 2026.

Budget Updates






ADOPTED FY26 TAX RATE

At the August 25th City Council meeting, a ***no-new revenue tax rate*** of **\$.363836** was adopted by Council for the FY26 budget. Woodway taxpayers will pay the City \$363.84 per \$100,000 of the property taxable value. The average taxable value in Woodway is \$424,550 which would cost the property owner \$1544.68 in City taxes annually or \$128.72 monthly.



Utility Rate Changes for 2025-2026

The City wants to inform citizens of two important rate adjustments that will go into effect on October 1, 2025.

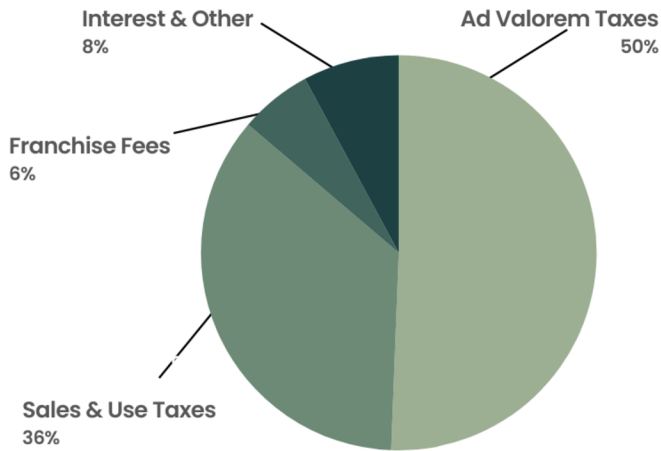
The City's garbage service provider, Frontier Waste Services, increased the City's cost by 2.97% over the summer. Additionally, the City of Waco raised landfill costs by 4% as of September 1st. These changes necessitated a 6% increase in all sanitation rates.

Another significant utility billing change is the addition of a 3% fee for credit card payments. This is the fee charged to us by the credit card processor and will directly offset those costs. All other forms of payment, including bank draft/ACH will not have an associated fee.

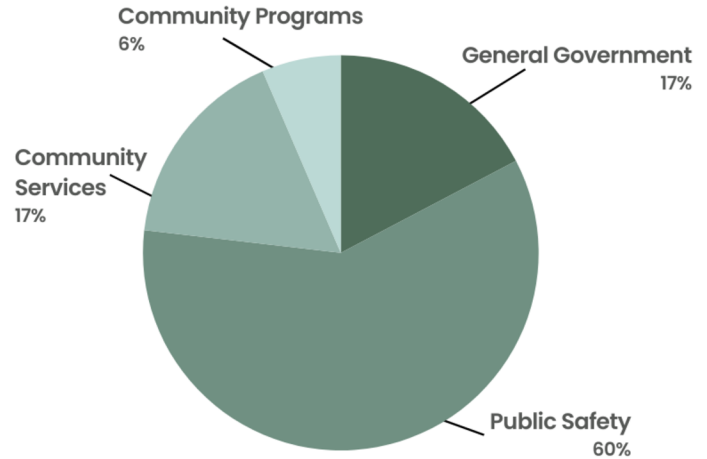

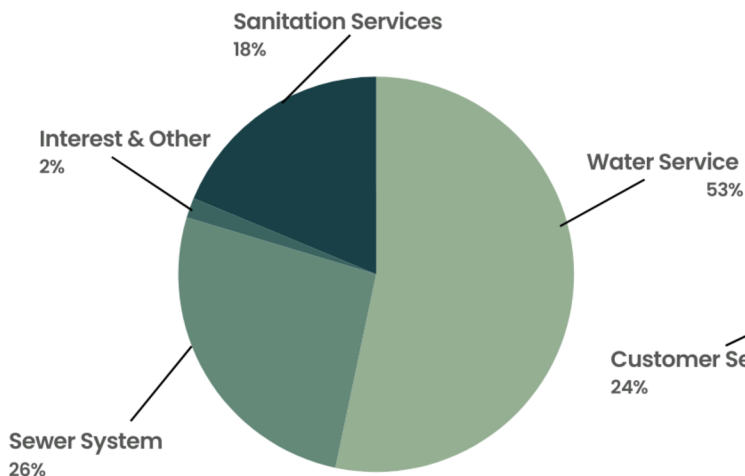

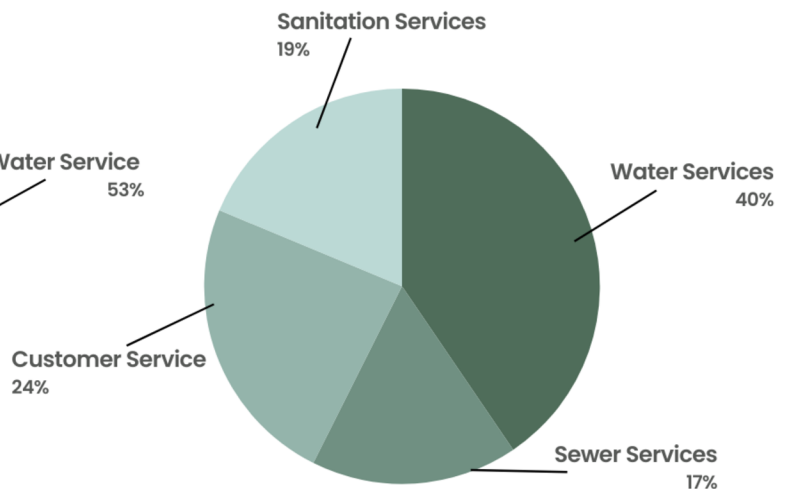

Woodway Public Safety Department Safety Tips



- **WAIT SAFELY:**
STAND BACK FROM THE CURB WHILE WAITING FOR THE BUS.
- **BOARDING AND EXITING:**
ENTER AND EXIT THE BUS CAREFULLY, STAYING IN THE DRIVER'S SIGHT.
- **BUS SAFETY ZONES:**
AVOID WALKING BEHIND THE BUS, AND BE AWARE OF OTHER VEHICLES AND THE DANGER ZONES AROUND THE BUS.



- **STAY SEATED:**
REMAIN SEATED WHILE THE BUS IS MOVING.
 - **USE INSIDE VOICES:**
LOUD NOISES CAN DISTRACT THE DRIVER, SO STUDENTS SHOULD USE QUIET VOICES.
 - **FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS:**
THE DRIVER (OR BUS AIDE, IF THERE IS ONE) IS IN CHARGE. THEIR INSTRUCTIONS SHOULD BE FOLLOWED CAREFULLY.

Tips for Drivers.

IF YOU DO NOT HAVE KIDS AT HOME, IT MIGHT BE EASY TO FORGET THAT SUMMER IS WINDING DOWN AND SCHOOL IS BACK IN SESSION! REMEMBER THESE TIPS TO MAKE SURE THAT EVERYONE STAYS SAFE!

- **SCHOOL ZONES:**
BE EXTRA CAUTIOUS IN SCHOOL ZONES, OBEYING SPEED LIMITS AND AVOIDING DISTRACTIONS.
- **PEDESTRIAN SAFETY:**
YIELD TO PEDESTRIANS IN CROSSWALKS AND BE AWARE OF CHILDREN WALKING OR BIKING TO SCHOOL.
- **SCHOOL BUS SAFETY:**
STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES WITH FLASHING RED LIGHTS AND WATCH FOR CHILDREN BOARDING OR EXITING.
- **AVOID DISTRACTIONS:**
DO NOT USE CELL PHONES OR OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES WHILE DRIVING, ESPECIALLY IN SCHOOL ZONES.

Walking to school:

WALKING TO SCHOOL CAN BE A LOT OF FUN FOR A YOUNG STUDENT! TO STAY SAFE, IT IS IMPORTANT TO REMEMBER THESE TIPS!



- **SIDEWALKS AND CROSSWALKS:**
ALWAYS USE SIDEWALKS WHEN AVAILABLE, AND CROSS STREETS AT INTERSECTIONS OR CROSSWALKS.
- **LOOK BOTH WAYS:**
BEFORE CROSSING THE STREET, LOOK LEFT, LOOK RIGHT, AND LEFT AGAIN, AND MAKE EYE CONTACT WITH DRIVERS.
- **BE VISIBLE:**
WEAR BRIGHT CLOTHING AND CONSIDER USING REFLECTIVE GEAR, ESPECIALLY DURING THE EARLY MORNING OR LATE AFTERNOON.
- **STAY ALERT:**
AVOID USING ELECTRONIC DEVICES THAT CAN DISTRACT FROM TRAFFIC.
- **BUDDY UP:**
WALKING WITH A FRIEND OR IN A GROUP CAN ENHANCE SAFETY.
- **EMERGENCY PLAN:**
HAVE A PLAN IN CASE OF EMERGENCIES OR UNEXPECTED SITUATIONS.



Biking to School:

- **HELMET AND VISIBILITY:**
ALWAYS WEAR A PROPERLY FITTED AND FASTENED HELMET AND BRIGHT CLOTHING. USE FRONT AND REAR LIGHTS, AND MAKE SURE THE BIKE HAS REFLECTORS ON THE WHEELS, PEDALS, AND REAR.
- **TRAFFIC LAWS:**
FOLLOW ALL TRAFFIC LAWS, USE BIKE LANES WHERE AVAILABLE, AND OBEY TRAFFIC SIGNALS.
- **SECURE THE BIKE:**
ENSURE THE BIKE IS IN THE DESIGNATED BIKE RACK OR AREA AND LOCKED PROPERLY WHEN ARRIVING AT SCHOOL.
- **BE ALERT:**
BE AWARE OF SURROUNDINGS, WATCH FOR OBSTACLES, AND AVOID DISTRACTIONS.



BIKES ARE A FUN AND FAST WAY TO GET TO SCHOOL! REMEMBER THESE IMPORTANT SAFETY TIPS SO THAT YOU ALWAYS ARRIVE SAFELY!

- **PLAN ROUTES:**
PLAN AND PRACTICE ROUTES TO AND FROM SCHOOL WITH CHILDREN, HIGHLIGHTING SAFE PATHS AND POTENTIAL HAZARDS.
- **DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP:**
FOLLOW SCHOOL GUIDELINES FOR DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP ZONES, AND AVOID BLOCKING TRAFFIC OR PARKING IN UNSAFE AREAS.
- **BACKPACK SAFETY:**
CHOOSE BACKPACKS WITH WIDE, PADDED STRAPS AND A PADDED BACK. PACK HEAVIER ITEMS CLOSEST TO THE CENTER OF THE BACK. THE BACKPACK SHOULD NOT EXCEED 16-28% OF THE CHILD'S WEIGHT.
- **COMMUNICATION & SAFETY:**
ESTABLISH CLEAR COMMUNICATION CHANNELS WITH CHILDREN, TEACHERS, AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION, INCLUDING PHONE NUMBERS AND EMERGENCY CONTACTS. TEACH CHILDREN ABOUT STRANGER DANGER, SAFETY RULES, AND WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY.

Our beautiful Texas Hill Country experienced an unimaginable tragedy over the summer, reminding us all of how quickly Mother Nature can shift from calm to catastrophe. While flooding on that scale is not common, emergency rescues during more isolated flooding events are not unusual. Help us keep you safe by learning more about one of the most powerful and dangerous forces on our planet.

FLOOD AND FLASH FLOOD SAFETY

IF YOU ARE CAUGHT IN OR NEAR RISING WATER, seek higher ground immediately.	<small>INFORMATION PROVIDED BY: NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE</small>	AVOID FLOODWATERS. Do not drive or walk through flooded areas. Swift, rising water and hidden debris or hazards like rocks, trees, or power lines can be deadly.
Six inches of moving water is enough to knock an adult down, and 18-24 inches is capable of sweeping away most vehicles.	Flooding is the top cause of storm-related deaths in the U.S., averaging 127 per year.	Flood damage is often not covered by standard homeowner's insurance.
STAY INFORMED by monitoring weather stations for emergency broadcasts and instructions.	Water moving at just 4 mph can exert a force comparable to an EF2 tornado's winds.	KNOW YOUR RISK. Identify flood-prone areas in your community and understand your local flood risk.
FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS OF FIRST RESPONDERS. If instructed to evacuate, leave the area promptly and move to higher ground.		

Around half of all flash flood fatalities are related to vehicles.
If your vehicle stalls in a flooded area, please:

- CALL 911!**
- Notify first responders of your location and follow all instructions.

- ASSESS WATER DEPTH**
- If the water is shallow (less than a few inches) and not rising, you may be able to safely exit the vehicle.
 - If water is deep or moving swiftly, stay inside unless the vehicle is being swept away or water is entering the passenger cabin.

- EXIT THE VEHICLE SAFELY (IF POSSIBLE)**
- Unbuckle your seatbelt and unlock the doors.
 - Open windows if possible, as doors may be hard to open due to water pressure.
 - Exit the vehicle and move to higher ground immediately, avoiding walking through fast-moving water.

FALL SAFETY TIPS

Fall weather does not mean that snakes, bees, and wasps are no longer active. In fact, it might mean just the opposite! As you venture outside to take advantage of cooler temperatures, keep these safety tips in mind:

SNAKES will be increasingly active as temperatures begin to cool down, seeking food and shelter before entering their hibernation-like state, called brumation.
During the autumn months:

- Maintain a tidy yard to limit hiding spots for snakes and their prey. Elevate firewood piles, and place them away from your house.
- Manage food sources. Pet food or bird feeders close to the house may attract rodents, which then provides a food source for snakes.
- Be aware of your surroundings and wear closed-toe shoes and long pants when walking in snake-prone areas like tall grass.
- If bitten, seek immediate medical attention. Do not attempt to suck out venom, apply a tourniquet, or use ice.

While **BEEES** tend to become less active as the weather gets cooler, **WASPS** may actually become more aggressive as they compete for remaining resources and protect their nests. Practicing safety while also protecting native pollinators can be challenging.
Consider the following tips this fall:

- Remove attractants, like spills, open trash cans, or fallen fruit from trees and gardens.
- Seal cracks and gaps in your home's exterior to prevent wasps from entering for shelter.
- Consider planting wasp-repellent plants like mint, eucalyptus, or citronella, or using natural repellents like peppermint oil spray.
- For large or hard-to-reach hives or nests, or if you have known allergies, consider contacting a professional bee removal or pest control company.

- THE VILLAGE OF WOODWAY WAS OFFICIALLY INCORPORATED JUNE 20, 1955 WITH A POPULATION OF 250.
- IN 1973, WOODWAY BECAME A CITY WITH A HOME-RULE FORM OF GOVERNMENT. CARLEEN BRIGHT HELPED DRAFT THE FIRST CHARTER.
- THE POLICE AND FIRE DEPARTMENTS WERE COMBINED IN 1975, BECOMING THE PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT.
- CITY OFFICES WERE LOCATED AT 200 SHARRON DRIVE UNTIL MARCH 1992.
- WOODWAY HAS HAD 9 CITY MANAGERS AND 18 MAYORS IN THE 70 YEARS SINCE INCORPORATION

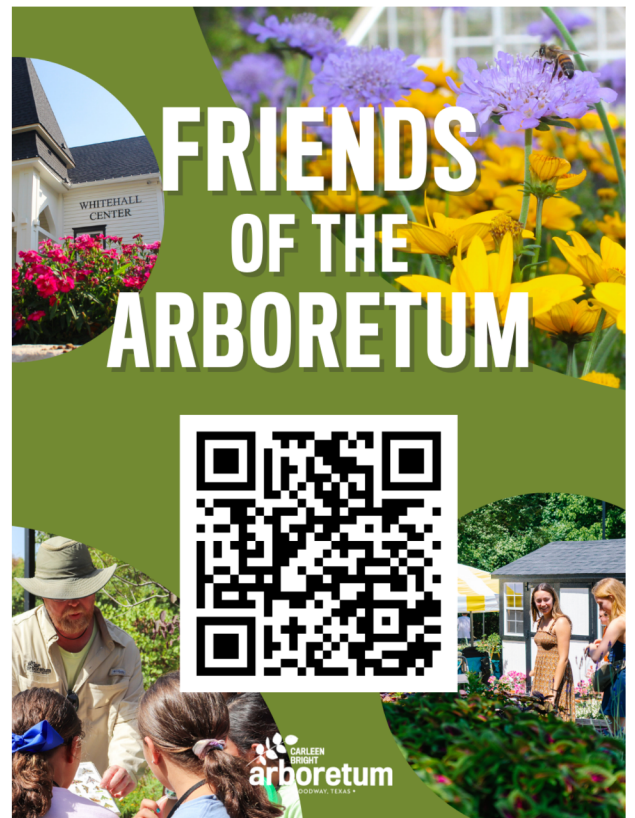




